Trustees' Report

Mission and Aims

The WCIA's mission is to enable the people of Wales to understand and act on international issues.

It aims to achieve this by:

- · raising awareness of global issues
- helping people, especially young people, develop the skills they need to understand and confront these issues
- acting as a forum for individuals and organisations in Wales to exchange ideas, build partnerships, and work towards common goals in line with the WCIA's values

Structure, Governance and Management

Structure

The Welsh Centre for International Affairs (WCIA) is an autonomous charity established by trust deed, registered number 259701. It was established in 1973 and is based at the Welsh National Temple of Peace and Health in Cardiff. The WCIA incorporates an educational arm (Council for Education for World Citizenship – CEWC) and a campaigns/advocacy arm (the United Nations Association Wales), both of which were formerly separate bodies. It also has close relationships with other internationalist organisations based in the Temple of Peace (especially UNA Exchange) and with the David Davies Memorial Institute based in Aberystwyth University.

Governance and staffing

The WCIA has a board of up to 16 trustees, who meet on a quarterly basis to take key decisions about the organisations' activities and financial affairs, to guide future strategic development, and to ensure that the charity complies with statutory requirements. It delegates detailed financial discussions to a Finance Committee, which usually meets 3 times a year. There is also an Annual General Meeting of individual members of the WCIA and UNA Wales, and of the WCIA Standing Conference of affiliated organisations.

A staff team co-ordinates the WCIA's activities on a day-to-day basis, under the guidance of its Chief Executive. There is additional support from volunteers, who this year constituted the equivalent of one half-time staff member in terms of the hours contributed.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

The trustees who served during the year are listed on page 1. The trust deed and constitution provide means to recruit and appoint trustees when individual terms of office come to an end. The WCIA has recently adopted an open recruitment process for new trustees, emphasising the need for a broad base of knowledge and experience to match our diverse range of activities.

Trustee induction and training

Trustees are offered initial training on the background to the organisation and their role in its management. They are asked to complete a declaration of any potential conflict of interests. There are regular opportunities for trustees to attend WCIA events, and we have a modest training budget to help meet professional development needs as they arise. Charity Commission documentation is distributed as reference material for trustees when of direct importance.

Ensuring our work delivers our aims

The WCIA is currently working to deliver a three-year strategy (2011-14) which was developed in consultation with members, staff, trustees and other key stakeholders. The WCIA Board of Trustees approves an annual operational plan to deliver this strategy, and the Chief Executive reports regularly to the Board about whether the plan's objectives are being achieved.

The trustees also comply with their duty to ensure that the WCIA's work is of public benefit, as defined by Charity Commission guidance.

Key achievements in 2011-12

- Completion of the WCIA's integration with CEWC and UNA Wales
- 2. Development of a new, 3-year strategy for the united WCIA, including a review of our mission and aims
- 3. Launch of the Wales International Development Hub, hosted by the WCIA and funded by the Welsh Government
- 4. Over 2,500 students from 131 schools and colleges benefited from our educational programme.
- 5. Over 750 members of the public were engaged in our evening seminars and lectures, held in the name of the WCIA or UNA Wales.
- 6. Successful organisation of the 2011 International Development Summit, attended by 300 people.
- 7. Reforms to our Board of Trustees and appointment of 8 new trustees.

During 2011-12 we finalised several years of work to merge three previously separate organisations: the WCIA itself (which has been at the heart of our work to engage the public with global issues), the Council for Education in World Citizenship (CEWC) (which encompasses our work with schools and colleges) and the United Nations Association Wales (which campaigns in support of the UN's goals).

This developed from an initial Strategy Day with over 30 stakeholders from civil society, public bodies and of course our own members and trustees. We consider our new strategy to be an interim approach, covering priority actions for the years 2011 to 2014, and intended to lead to a more ambitious five-year strategy thereafter.

Our three key strategic goals in this period are:

- Achieving financial sustainability rebalancing our income in favour of project-funded activities, with the intention to achieve a balanced budget by March 2014.
- Innovation and evolution reallocating resources towards new activity ideas; engaging new audiences
 and building new partnerships; and rebranding the WCIA to reflect its new approach.
- Reforming governance involving trustees more deeply in ongoing strategic support for the WCIA, and implementing best-practice workplace policies.

Towards the end of the year, the WCIA received grant funding from the Welsh Government to host the new Hub from February 2012 to March 2014. Its main activities include supporting networking and collaboration between the various groups in the sector; delivering training to enhance the sector's capacity; maintaining a calendar of events, campaigns and opportunities; and supporting the representation of international development within the Welsh Government.

Its initial steering group comprised colleagues from Fair Trade Wales, the Network of Development Researchers, SMIDOS, the Sub-Saharan Advisory Panel, Wales Africa Community Links, Wales for Africa Health Links, and international NGOs including Oxfam and Christian Aid.

The programme included:

- Six Model United Nations Conferences in partnership with Oxfam Cymru, focusing on the issue of global food security. We also ran a number of Model UN sessions for Welsh Baccalaureate groups in individual schools.
- Consolidation of our work on Philosophy for Children, with the second successful year of our Wiser Wales project. Over 35 primary and secondary schools took part in the project, which enables pupils to develop their critical and creative thinking abilities as well as their social skills so that they can be more confident in discussing issues of global importance.

- Outstanding success in the field of **debating**. Over 60 schools and colleges took part in the 2011 Wales

 Schools Debating Championships, and Wales reached the Grand Final at the 2012 World Championships in Cape Town.
- Two forums of the European Youth Parliament, held at Colwyn Bay Town Hall and the National Assembly for Wales, Cardiff Bay.
- Over 1,200 students involved in school visits, where we delivered workshops and talks on subjects including human rights, democratic participation, climate change, poverty and the work of the United Nations.

Our three high-profile lecturers over the year were:

- · Professor Lyn Evans, leader of the international project to construct the Large Hadron Collider
- Alan Doss, former UN special representative to the Democratic Republic of the Congo
- · Lord (George) Robertson, former Labour Defence Minister and NATO Secretary General

We also continued our series of popular evening seminars, with events including:

- "Tackling Torture" (with Professor Malcolm Evans, member of the UN Sub-Committee On the Prevention of Torture)
- "Refuges and Refugees: Women in Conflict, Home and Away" (with author Erin Pizzey)
- "On the Front Line: Reporting from the Arab Spring" (with Wyre Davies, BBC Middle East correspondent)
- "Corporate Social Responsibility in Wales: Launch of the UN Global Compact" (chaired by Peter Davies, Sustainable Futures Commissioner for Wales)
- "What Does It Mean To Be European?" (chaired by Andy Klom, head of the European Commission Office in Wales)
- "Environmental Decision Making in Wales and Europe" (with Jane Davidson of INSPIRE and Gwion Lewis of Landmark Chambers)

This took place at Cardiff City Stadium and was attended by 300 practitioners, volunteers, researchers and others active in development work in Wales. It included workshops on a range of topics including health, gender, food security, disability in Africa and Wales, and opportunities for diaspora groups contributing to international development.

This took place towards the end of the year, with Dr Ian Jones appointed as the new Chair of the Board.

Key objectives for 2012-13

Attract new partners and funding for our WCIA/UNA Wales public engagement events, and increased funding for our CEWC educational activities

- Revitalise the campaigning and advocacy efforts of UNA Wales, with particular emphasis on working with young adults
- Develop the Wales International Development Hub successfully in its first full year of operation
- Merge the membership systems of the WCIA and UNA Wales, thereby creating more effective links between our networks of supporters; and improve the range of benefits for members
- Secure the future of our Philosophy for Children work through successful conclusion of the Wiser
 Wales project and development of a successor project

- Improve the use of social media and other online communications, in order to reach out to a wider WCIA audience
- Improve the WCIA's governance by working effectively with the new Board of Trustees, reforming
 the WCIA Standing Conference, and ensuring compliance with Charity Commission guidelines on good practice

Financial Review

The financial statements of the charity are set out on pages 10 to 23.

The Statement of Financial Activities shows a net reduction in funds of £41,609 (2011 – net reduction of £15,287). This result is slightly better than the Board of Trustees' agreed deficit target of £45,000 for the year. The deficit is due to a range of factors, including the reduced availability of core funding in recent years, and a previous over-reliance on using dividends from the WCIA's investments to achieve a balanced budget. The WCIA has a three-year strategy to reduce the deficit to zero by the end of 2013-14, by securing more project funding and corporate support as well as by reducing costs wherever possible.

While the result may look poorer than that for 2010-11, in fact the previous year's figure was boosted by a one-off income from the WCIA's merger with the United Nations Association Wales. Now that the organisation is a single, consolidated entity, a true like-for-like comparison will be possible from 2012-13 onwards.

Reserves Policy

A written reserves policy exists for the WCIA. The organisation sets out to maintain regular income from its unrestricted reserves, so as to cover recurring expenditure and provide development opportunities. It also utilises its restricted funds in a planned way, and in conformity with grant criteria where these apply. The sum set for unrestricted reserves by trustees was £450,000 during the year. Unrestricted funds stood at £429,426 on 31 March 2011, and a deficit of £29,500 is projected for 2012-13, so the reserves target will be revised to £400,000.

Principal Funding Sources

Income from room hire and use of the Temple of Peace premises, and donations from individuals and organisations towards the WCIA's charitable activities, remained broadly constant during the year with the exception of a major new grant from the Welsh Government for work on the International Development Hub. In addition, CEWC's work receives funding from unitary authorities, charitable trusts, school and college members and corporate interests. Investment income remained a further financing source.

Investment Policy

The WCIA has an investment policy, applied to its portfolio held by Barclays Wealth/Gerrard stockbrokers, which is reviewed annually by its Finance Committee and approved by its trustees. The policy includes conditions for ethical investment. The Finance Committee meets twice a year to review the portfolio, as well as the WCIA's separate investments in the COIF Property Fund.

Responsibilities of the trustees

Law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the trustees have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). The financial statements are required by law to give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the surplus or deficit of the charity for that period.

In preparing these financial statements the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- make judgements that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Independent Auditors' Report to the Trustees of

We have audited the financial statements of Welsh Centre for International Affairs for the year ended 31 March 2012 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet and the related notes. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2012

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005)', issued in March 2005, applicable accounting standards and the Charities Act 2011.

Fund accounting policy

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees' discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds are those donated for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

Further details of each fund are disclosed in note 16.

Incoming resources

Voluntary income including donations and legacies is recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the statement of financial activities at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

Income from charitable activities includes income recognised as earned (as the related goods or services are provided) under contract or where entitlement to grant funding is subject to specific performance conditions. Grant income included in this category provides funding to support programme activities and is recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category.

Costs of generating funds are the costs of trading for fundraising purposes.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs

Governance costs include costs of the preparation and examination of the statutory accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and the cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

Support costs

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources, for example, allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capita, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

Fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £100 or more are initially recorded at cost.

Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:

Fixtures and fittings

25% straight line basis

Investments

Fixed asset investments are included at market value at the balance sheet date.

Realised gains and losses on investments are calculated upon the sale of investments as the difference between sales proceeds and their market value at the start of the year, or their subsequent cost, and are charged or credited to the statement of the financial activities in the period of disposal.

Unrealised gains and losses represent the movement in market values during the year and are credited or charged to the statement of financial activities based on the market value at the year end. Such gains and losses relate to investments which are still under the ownership of the charity and will not become realised until such time as the assets are sold as noted above.

Pensions

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions are charged in the statement of financial activities as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme.

Bad debts written off in the year have arisen due to an old debtor balance of £6,390 relating to Velindre NHS Trust, which has been carried in recent years as owed to the charity, having been released as non-recoverable during the year ended 31 March 2012. This balance has been partially offset by the release of an aged CEWC creditor of £3,152 which it has been confirmed is no longer due from the Charity. It is not considered that these write offs are of a sufficient size as to warrant any prior period amendments to these accounts.

The International Brigade Association Fund was provided to foster the international awareness of young people to enable them to travel or work abroad, with particular reference to Spain.

The Goronwy Jones Memorial Fund was set up for the production of special WCIA publications.

The Mrs JT Morgan Travelling Scholarship was given to enable WCIA staff members to undertake work related visits to less-developed countries.

The Development Education Fund was provided for the development of education / global citizenship education work within the UK. Of the £80,606 held in this fund as at 31 March 2011, £10,606 was held in the specific Fund bank account whilst the balance of £70,000 relates to investments which have been allocated within the charity's portfolio.

The Sallie Davies Memorial Fund was provided for the sponsorship of educational initiatives, including Wales's participation in the World Schools Debating Championships.

The Esmee Fairbarn funding has been provided to support the development of philosophy for Children (P4C) in Welsh schools.

The Paul Hamlyn Foundation funding has been provided to establish whole-school practices and inter-school networks that will extend the use of Philosophy for Children as an effective means o skills development.

The British Council Wales funding has been granted to support CEWC-Cymru debating activities in 2011.

The Dwr Cymru funding has been granted to support the organisation of Model United NAtions conferences during the 2010 - 11 school year end.

The Jane Hodge Fountation funding has been granted in support of the Wales Schools Debating Championships.

The Welsh Government funding in connection with Wales for Africa has been granted to support the summit in July 2011 in relation to this project.

The Welsh Government funding of £40,000 was granted for delivery on the International Development Hub project in the 2011-12 year end.

17 Transfers

During the year the trustees have elected to transfer £569 from general unrestricted funds to the Sallie Davies Memorial fund.
